

SERIES THEME: OUR WORSHIP; WHY WE DO WHAT WE DO

Through the month of August, we will take a step back and look at "why we do what we do" in our worship services. We will be covering four areas of our worship: Confession and Absolution, The reading of The Word, Prayer, and The Sacraments. These are vital elements to our worship of our God, Savior, and King. It is fitting that we pause and reflect on each of these elements of our worship.

THEME FOR THIS WEEK: THE READING OF THE WORD

The Word of God is the chief element of our worship. Without the Holy Scriptures, we have nothing. In our worship, we have 4 readings, which may include passages from The Old Testament, the Psalms, The Epistles, and The Gospels. At St. John's & Emmanuel, we follow the 3-year lectionary, in which currently we are in Year A.

PASTOR HANNEMAN'S SERMON: Matthew 14:22-33 "Why Do Christians Have Doubts?"

This week's order of worship will be in this bulletin. The Scripture Readings will continue with the theme **Define Christian.** This week is the Eleventh Sunday after Pentecost; Define Christian: The Christian Answers Doubt With Faith.

THE CHRISTIAN ANSWERS DOUBT WITH FAITH.

Wherever faith clings to the promises of God, doubt is always lingering in the back of our mind, constantly asking the serpent's garden question, "Did God really say?" How striking to think that one must have faith in God before it is even possible to doubt him! It is not uncommon that, in times of aversity, doubt rears its ugly head—doubts about God's care, God's promises, God's providence. In those times, the true answer to doubt is not found in some great miracle that removes adversity, but in the still small voice of our Savior God whispering to us in his Word. Through that Word Christ reaches out to us with nail scarred hands, proof of his great love. Jesus gently says, "Why did you doubt?" Our faith is restored. The Christian answers doubt with faith because Jesus makes it so.

Confession

<u>Pastor:</u> If we claim to be without sin, we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us.

<u>Congregation:</u> If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.

Pastor: Let us confess our sins to the Lord.

<u>Congregation:</u> Holy God, gracious Father, I am sinful by nature and have sinned against you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have not loved you with my whole heart; I have not loved others as I should. I deserve your punishment both now and forever. But Jesus, my Savior, paid for my sins with his innocent suffering and death. Trusting in him, I pray: God, have mercy on me, a sinner.

The Word

Reader: Now we come to the Word section of The Service; we see it in large letters in the hymnal: **The Word.** When the early Christians "devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching," they were eager to hear about the words and works of Jesus. The apostles were the Savior's witnesses and had heard and seen Jesus in person. The Service follows that pattern: it highlights the words and works of Jesus in a reading from one of the four gospels. A unique feature of our order of service is what we call the **Proper**: a set of readings, prayers, psalms, and hymns that focus on the main truth of the day's Gospel. As the truth in the Gospel changes from week to week and on the various festivals of the year, the Proper changes, too. The gospel accounts and their Proper are guided by the **Christian Calendar** or **Church Year**. Over the course of centuries, Christian churches developed a plan to review the words and works of Christ every year. We divide the calendar into two parts: the Time of Christ and the Time of the Church. The Time of Christ (which our hymnal divides into the Time of Christmas and the Time of Easter) occurs between late November and May. It focuses on the main events of Jesus' life and so includes the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, and Easter. It ends with the Day of Pentecost and Sunday of the Holy Trinity. The Time of the Church focuses on words Jesus spoke during his ministry to guide us in our lives as Christians. The Proper for today is the Proper appointed for this Sunday in the Church Year.

Pastor: The Lord be with you.

Congregation: And also with you.

Prayer of the Day

Reader: The Proper begins with the **Prayer of the Day**. The minister invites the congregation to bring this prayer to God: "Let us pray," he says. The prayer requests the blessings that are going to be given in the readings and the sermon on this day.

Pastor: Let us pray.

Almighty and most merciful God, preserve us from all harm and danger that we, being ready in both body and soul, may cheerfully accomplish what you want done; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

Congregation: Amen.

Reader: There are three readings in The Service. The **First Reading** is usually from the Old Testament and helps us to see that the words and works of Jesus in the Gospel for the day were promised and applied even before he came to earth. Worshipers become involved in the reading by responding to the minister's concluding sentence: "The Word of the Lord." Worshipers say with joy: "Thanks be to God."

FIRST READING: 1 Kings 19:9–18

(The Lord answers Elijah's doubt not with a great show of power but with the gentle whisper of God's gracious promise.)

⁹There he went into a cave and spent the night. And the word of the LORD came to him: "What are you doing here, Elijah?" ¹⁰He replied, "I have been very zealous for the LORD God Almighty. The Israelites have rejected your covenant, torn down your altars, and put your prophets to death with the sword. I am the only one left, and now they are trying to kill me too." 11The LORD said, "Go out and stand on the mountain in the presence of the LORD, for the LORD is about to pass by." Then a great and powerful wind tore the mountains apart and shattered the rocks before the LORD, but the LORD was not in the wind. After the wind there was an earthquake, but the LORD was not in the earthquake. ¹²After the earthquake came a fire, but the LORD was not in the fire. And after the fire came a gentle whisper. ¹³When Elijah heard it, he pulled his cloak over his face and went out and stood at the mouth of the cave. Then a voice said to him, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" ¹⁴He replied, "I have been very zealous for the LORD God Almighty. The Israelites have rejected your covenant, torn down your altars, and put your prophets to death with the sword. I am the only one left, and now they are trying to kill me too." ¹⁵The LORD said to him, "Go back the way you came, and go to the Desert of Damascus. When you get there, anoint Hazael king over Aram. ¹⁶Also, anoint Jehu son of Nimshi king over Israel, and anoint Elisha son of Shaphat from Abel Meholah to succeed you as prophet. ¹⁷Jehu will put to death any who escape the sword of Hazael, and Elisha will put to death any who escape the sword of Jehu. ¹⁸Yet I reserve seven thousand in Israel—all whose knees have not bowed down to Baal and whose mouths have not kissed him."

The Word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

Reader: The Book of Psalms was the hymnal of the Old Testament and is filled with praises and prayers about God's great love. The **Psalm of the Day** matches the theme of the day's Gospel and enables worshipers to proclaim the Word of God in music and to take their turn to declare the wonders God has done.

Reader: The **Second Reading** is from one of the New Testament letters, the epistles. This reading also complements the theme of the day's Gospel. Again worshipers respond with thanks after hearing the Word of the Lord.


SECOND READING: Romans 8:28–39

(Paul teaches that in all things, good times and bad, we can trust that God is carrying out his perfect plan for his glory and our salvation.)

²⁸And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. ²⁹For those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brothers and sisters. ³⁰And those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified. ³¹What, then, shall we say in response to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³²He who did not spare his own Son, but gave him up for us all—how will he not also, along with him, graciously give us all things? 33Who will bring any charge against those whom God has chosen? It is God who justifies. 34Who then is the one who condemns? No one. Christ Jesus who died—more than that, who was raised to life—is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. 35Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? ³⁶As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered." ³⁷No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, ³⁹neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

GOSPEL READING: Matthew 14:22–33 (Sermon Text)

(In the account of Peter walking on the water, we see how quickly doubt challenges faith. And we see how graciously Jesus responds to our doubt.)

²²Immediately Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowd. ²³After he had dismissed them, he went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. Later that night, he was there alone, ²⁴and the boat was already a considerable distance from land, buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it. ²⁵Shortly before dawn Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake. ²⁶When the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified. "It's a ghost," they said, and cried out in fear. ²⁷But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." ²⁸"Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water." ²⁹"Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. ³⁰But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" ³¹Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. "You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?" ³²And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. ³³Then those who were in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the Son of God."

SERMON Matthew 14:22-33 "Why Do Christians Have Doubts?"

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. 




Words of Institution
