I want to have more happiness in my life.

Can God help me find it?

We need to begin by asking, "What do we mean by happiness?" For a child, happiness might mean getting Christmas presents every morning and cake and ice cream for every meal. After a few days, though, it would stop being fun. Many adults think that money will make them happy. But we have seen many rich people who are unhappy and even depressed. Others might think that drugs and alcohol make them happy. But the "high" soon wears off. Finding happiness in the things and people of this world is an exercise in frustration.

The Bible uses the word "blessed" to describe happiness. The blessings of God give us true happiness. The most important of God's blessings is Jesus, whom he sent into this world. Jesus took the blame for everything we ever did wrong. That's why he died on the cross—not because he did anything wrong, but because we did. Jesus has paid for our sins, and that means we are saved from God's judgment of eternal death by believing in him. That makes us happy. Jesus blesses us with salvation.

No matter how long we live, we are all destined to die. But when Jesus rose from the dead on Easter morning, he broke the hold of death. Even though we will one day die, by trusting in Jesus, we have the sure hope that we will also come back to life and live forever in heaven. That makes us happy. Jesus blesses us with eternal life.

God even uses the tough times in life for our good—to teach us more about his love and strengthen our trust in him. No matter how tough life is for us, no matter how much pain we endure, and no matter how poor we are, no one and nothing can take away what Jesus did for us. Our sins are forgiven by God, and through faith in Jesus, eternal life in heaven is waiting for us. That makes us happy. Sometimes we smile through tears, but we can still smile.

Can God help us find happiness? He has already given it to us through Jesus.



From an Ex-Pastor's Perch



The earth is the Lord's and everything in it, and all who live in it."
(Psalm 24:1)

I've got Stewardship on my mind this month. Two recent random happenings put it on my brain and now in print. One was an email announcement received, outlining a new ministry tool for congregations about stewardship. The other was a 40 + year-old rediscovered document that has been sitting patiently in one of my "maybe I will need this someday" files.

The "new" ministry tool is called *The Stewardship Legacy Series*. It promises multiple years of resources and encouragement for pastors/congregation leaders including worship ideas and Bible study resources, all ready to be downloaded electronically.

The "old" and somewhat yellowing mimeographed document was titled simply *What is Stewardship?* It explained in a simple and straightforward way the age-old definition of "stewardship" as the "management" of an owner's (God's) resources. See Psalm 24:1 above.

It struck me how even after almost half a century these two tools are so different and yet how they are basically the same. The current offering focuses on the different areas of stewardship as the five "T"s of <u>Time</u>, <u>Talent</u>, <u>Treasure</u>, <u>Temple</u>, and <u>Truth</u>. The old offering uses a clever acronym to say pretty much the same thing – Stewardship is spelled <u>Soul</u>, <u>Time</u>, <u>Employment</u>, <u>Word</u>, <u>Abilities</u>, <u>Resources</u>, <u>Dollars</u>, <u>Service</u>, <u>Health</u>, <u>Intelligence</u>, <u>Play</u>.

Let me suggest a few words of hard-earned warning from personal observation and experience to all the above. The easiest way to deal with ministry enhancement tools (old or new) is to do nothing. Well-worn excuses and cliches will come naturally enough to defend this inactivity. Secondly, one sure-fire way to make sure these resources won't work is not to digest them thoroughly and make them your own so you can size them to fit your specific needs and situation. The one size-fits-all approach is often doomed to failure. Then, a common mistake is to think "one and done." Dutifully do a program once in a while, and that's it, but not be committed to this as an ongoing, continuous teaching process. Finally, since offerings always seem to need a boost year in and year out, keep on spelling "Stewardship" like this - \sum_textstyle tewardship! That'll turn many off, and besides, it sells God's Word short and robs God's people of needed nourishment.

As with every aspect of our personal and church life, it all begins with humble, Spirit-led repentance. Then it calls for serious study of the Scriptures. Permeate both with persistent prayer. THEN get to work! Maybe ask questions like 1) how can we intentionally challenge ourselves to grow in the area of stewardship? And 2) how can we encourage one another and be equipped with all God has given from his gracious hand? Start somewhere. And when it's all been said and done, find another way to say and do it again.

The Convention boasted 1,219 registered attendees. 1,285 attended the opening worship/communion service. LWMS mission offerings distributed \$46,688 to both home and world projects and over \$39,781 to the annual kids c.a.r.e. project. Convention worship service offerings will go to the home and world projects not selected by vote of the membership. Total LWMS membership stands at 786 congregations, 60 circuits, and 15 individual members. 58 circuits had representation at the circuit roll call.

The convention was a wonderful, joyful, and peace-filled event for all who were blessed to be in attendance.
