Can God help me be safe and sound?

"Let the little children COME!"

From an Ex-Pastor's Perch



We like to sing it and can do it with such feeling and gusto. Some will even break into part singing before it's over.

God's Word is our great heritage and shall be ours forever.
To shed its light from age to age shall be our chief endeavor.
In life it guides our way. In death it is our stay.
Lord, grant while worlds endure, we keep its teachings pure
Throughout all generations.

Lutheran worshipers have been singing that 18th century hymn since long before the old 1941 *The Lutheran Hymnal*. (That's two hymnals ago for those who are counting. Mine was blue. What color was yours?) The crucial question is, however, <u>do we actually believe it?!</u>

You may think that's a silly question, but is it? When professing Lutheran believers (Montello/Mecan included) are staying away from regular worship by the score, when you can almost count the number of Bible class attendees on one hand, and when biblical literacy is at a frighteningly dangerous level, can you blame anyone for asking?

Rather than merely singing the church-health blues, let's ask a few simple questions. Why? What can be done? What are we going to do about it? Let it all start with removing the "beam" from our own eye rather than worrying about the "speck" in eye of someone else. (Matthew 7:3-5). That means humbly approaching God's throne of grace in sincere repentance. If you are not sure what that means, then you had better find out! Then, in the joy and confidence of God's forgiveness we can begin to do some soul-searching along with some honest assessment and evaluation. All that may lead to re-thinking some stuff, fine-tuning any old stuff that is worth keeping, and being willing to try new and different stuff.

Let's all do some prayerful contemplating about our Emmanuel/St. John's congregation. Are there problems that need to be addressed? Are we confronted with challenges, either of our own making or those outside our control? What opportunities are slipping away? This is not the place to get specific, but someone, somehow, someway, needs to do just that. Are you in?

One thing we can say here, even must say again and again, is this. All depends on our possessing, God's abundant grace and blessing. It's a cliché, but it's true. We have to get into the Word, continue in the Word, believe the Word, and live the Word. No more excuses. No more rationalizations. No more blame game. The first Psalm puts it in simple terms. How blessed is the one whose delight is in the teaching of the Lord, and in that teaching mediates day and night... Everything he does prospers.

Summer is flying by. A new season of church life and ministry will soon be here. What needs to be done? What are we going to do? What are you going to do? Will it be the same old same old? God forbid! Let's get back into God's house and get under the Spirit's influence in Word and Sacrament. The old and life-experienced disciple Peter explained how to live as a believer in this world. He said to rid yourselves of all evil, all deceit, hypocrisy, jealousy, and all slander. Like newborn babies, crave the pure milk of the word so that by it you may grow up with the result being salvation. Certainly, you have tasted that the Lord is good. "

Gemeinde Geschichte (Congregation History)



St. John's Lutheran Church of Montello is a "daughter" congregation. The identity of the "mother" church might surprise some folks. She is Emmanuel Big Mecan. Today one might think it would be the opposite, but not in 1878 when the congregation was officially organized. Emmanuel was a seasoned 24 years old by then, and the nucleus for the new in-town parish was made up of parishioners from Emmanuel. They say a picture can speak a thousand words. If that's true, this picture speaks volumes. Let's listen to some of what it could tell us.

Montello looked different at the turn of the 20th century. The narrow dirt road heading east out of town doesn't look like the busy state highway we know today. It's different too in that it begins the slight veer to the right now labeled County Highway C. If you tried to follow the path of today's road, you would end up driving up the hill through woods and plowing into the Jaster farm *behind* the cemetery. (That would be the two generations ago Erwin Jaster.) Time doesn't stand still, which is a good lesson to remember for the life of the church too.

The church lot was only 40x25x16 which might explain the west facing front door. It is still the same corner, but people would come and go with a different perspective. So, it seems that perspective doesn't stay the same over time either. Sometimes you have to get used to seeing things in a different way, as hard as that can be for us.

You can't miss the school building in the center of the picture. Christian education has always been a priority at St. John's. For years the pastor did the teaching. It wasn't until 1928 that a formal school was organized and a teacher called. The building pictured was updated and expanded more than once until it was torn down and replaced in the 1960s. It had to be done! The needs of the church called for it.

No doubt the parishioners loved their first church building and made many cherished memories there. Still, by 1914, it was out with the old and in with the new. There is little room for nostalgic sentimentality when the ministry demands moving on and meeting spiritual needs.

For all the changing history St. John's has experienced, there is one thing that has stayed the same. Inside those walls the same gospel of Jesus was preached and taught, and the saving sacraments administered. It can be no other way. Finally, our story is about "His-story."

Be A Friend

to



The September Befriend-A-Mission Month observance at St. John's is orchestrated by the women of the Lutheran Women's Missionary Society (LWMS), but the activities are in no way meant only for women active in LWMS, nor for that matter, for only women. The Great Commission to "go into all the world and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) was and still is God's directive for every Christian, male & female, child & adult. The Great Commission is God's plan for spreading the Gospel throughout the world. But, how many of us lay workers in God's Kingdom will ever hit the road and physically share the Gospel in a home or world mission field? Very few. Yet it is still God's plan for each of us to actively work to spread the Gospel and to fulfill God's calling to us to "go and make disciples."

We are evangelical Christians--we *are* missionaries. We long for every person who can be saved to be saved, and thus to hasten the Lord's promised return to claim His church. So, are we missionaries only in our own family and in our own community? What about the "go into *all the world*" part of God's Commission?

While some of our offering are given as our CMO (Congregational Mission Offering), there is a very personal way to "be closer to the action" and it's so simple: **Be a friend**. The home and world missionaries of the WELS need all the support they can get to be the most effective for our Lord. **YOU can Be A Friend in three ways: 1) share gifts** (Congregation Mission Offerings & LWMS spring & fall mission offerings); **2) share encouragement** (cards, letters, & e-mails that offer God's Word and your own love and caring; and **3) PRAY, PRAY!**

The most important way anyone can Be A Friend to another person is to pray for them. But it seems that for many Lutheran Christians knowing exactly what to pray for our missionaries can be hard work. The following article is reprinted from www.allaboutprayer.org/prayers-for-missionaries to help make "hard work" easier!



What are some prayers for missionaries? Our prayers for missionaries should always be that they stand in God's armor and that their service as servants of God be not in their own strength but in the grace and strength of the LORD. We can pray for the missionary's protection from evil and that their daily needs be provided. Here are some specific, practical areas of missionaries' lives to pray for:


Solid family relationships. The tasks of full-time ministry, often in a foreign culture, can cause a strain on the relationships
within a family -- husbands and wives, parents and children. Pray that the Lord would strengthen these family bonds and
draw them close together.

- The well-being of family members from whom they are separated. When missionaries leave their homes to serve God on the
 mission field, extended family remains behind, and children sometimes leave their parents for schooling. Pray for the health,
 safety, and encouragement of these family members.
- Strength in the "inner man" (<u>Ephesians 3:16</u>). Loneliness, discouragement, despair -- these struggles occur in the lives of
 missionaries, and sometimes frequently. Pray that their hearts are encouraged and strengthened.
- Provision of physical needs. Missionaries depend on others for their financial support, and at times, that can be burdensome.
 Pray that God would supply their every need (Philippians 4:19).
- A strong personal walk with God. Pray for daily faithfulness to spend time in God's Word in the midst of ministry busyness.
 Ask God to protect and strengthen them spiritually and cause them to grow in their relationships with Him.
- Good physical health. In foreign lands, good health care can be hard to find. Pray for physical strength on a daily basis and long-term good health.
- Strong relationships with co-workers. Sadly, personality conflicts and relationship struggles happen among missionaries as
 they seek to work together to bring people to Christ. Pray for unselfishness, kindness, and humility in these cooperative
 efforts (Philippians 2:3-5).
- Ability to speak accurately. Ask God to cause them to speak with clarity and precision as they declare God's Word (Colossians 4:3-4).
- Opportunities to relax. Servants of God are just like anyone else--they need a break sometimes! Ask God to provide them
 with recreation and rest.
- Wisdom in all they do. Pray for the wisdom to make good decisions in their personal lives, as well as their ministry lives (James 1:5.)

In short, the model prayer that the LORD Jesus taught the disciples in (Matthew 6:9-13 is a good guideline for our prayers for missionaries. However, the key is not so much what we pray but that we pray and how we pray. In other words, prayers for missionaries should be a part of our personal worship time. Our prayers should be fervent, and come from a righteous heart that is in full relationship with God (James 5:16).

Effectual prayer is prayer in an attitude of fellowship and agreement with God's will. When we pray "Thy will be done" in specific areas of need, God not only changes us but He uses our prayers for it is the power behind His armor. "Pray in the Spirit on all occasions with all kinds of prayers and requests. With this in mind, be alert and always keep on praying for all the saints." (Ephesians 6:18).


